# LIFE AND FAITH THROUGH MY NEIGHBOUR'S LENS

A REFLECTION ON THE RECENT CONFERENCE, CHRISTIANS & MUSLIMS IN CONVERSATION BY PROF PETER RIDDELL

# What prompted us to sign up

Jesus commands us to not only "love the Lord our God" but to also "love our neighbour". In our multicultural and multiracial society, most of our neighbours subscribe to a different faith. How are we to love our neighbours then and obey Jesus' command, if we do not understand their faith values?

Our society is also full of strict, unspoken "out of bounds" (or OB) markers that govern how we interact with others from a different faith, especially Christians. Since we don't know where these are until we hit them, Christians tend to avoid discussions on issues of faith in the fear of inadvertently violating these markers and disturbing the peace. Furthermore, the prevalence of stereotypes also curtails meaningful interfaith

dialogue. Formed from quick assumptions, and perpetuated by ignorance, stereotypes, if left unaddressed, form barriers to understanding members of another faith.

The key to navigating OB markers and countering negative stereotypes is to have open and authentic conversations between Christians and members of other faiths, which naturally allow for a mutual understanding and respect to flourish.

Indeed, the Understanding Sacred Texts Conference organised by BGST was a first in such conversations which we have attended, and it not only gave us the opportunity to hear from learned scholars but also provided a precious space for us to practice such conversations with our Muslim friends.

# What we did

The conference opened with a lecture by Prof Peter Riddell. Prof Riddell covered a diverse range of topics including the history of Christianity and Islam, in particular, tracing the tension between both religions from the time of Abraham and Ishmael through historical accounts and writings. We were also challenged to identify the stereotypes which present-day Singapore Christians may have today of Islam and Muslims, and how these stereotypes impact the way we are to love them as our neighbours. Before we adjourned for the practicum, we were presented with some pointers on engaging in meaningful conversations about faith with our Muslim friends.

During the practicum, we were joined by about fifteen Muslim friends for a smaller group dialogue. This segment of the conference was moderated by the Leftwrite Center together with BGST. All the participants, Christians and Muslims, were encouraged to share their views on three main questions on faith: how do we practice our faith, who God is to us and how is this relationship with God manifested. Unsurprisingly, the conversations took us to dinner and we shared a halal meal with our Muslim friends at the end of the conference.

# What we took away

We distill our reflections from the experience as follows:

- 1. Challenges to our faiths. It was interesting to find out that the challenges we face within the church is not unique to us, as our Muslim friends appear to face the same challenges in their own community. We are both concerned about the stability of family units, growing rate of divorce, and the issues around LGBT. Likewise on the faith front, we both share the challenge of nurturing the next generation in their faith, and helping the young see the relevance of their faith. Decreasing literacy of our holy texts is also a common worrying trend. We felt that the sharing of our common struggles presented us with new opportunities to support each other, especially in the area of social concerns, for the common good of our society.
- 2. <u>Lifting the veil of ignorance</u>. More importantly, our veil of ignorance of the Muslim faith was lifted, thanks to the frank views of the two Muslim friends in our group. Their differing perspectives on the

- same issues served as a humbling reminder that our stereotypes of Muslims fall short of truly representing the Muslim community, and in fact, do a disservice to them. There is no one kind of Muslim, just as there is no one kind of Christian. Like us, they have the liberals and the conservatives, the devout and the dispassionate. We fail to love them if we box them up.
- 3. It will take time and effort. It was certainly refreshing to experience first-hand a desire of participants of both faiths for more of such open and authentic dialogue. The road ahead for interfaith understanding is a long and complex one. Understanding takes time to build and requires both vulnerability and humility from both ends. We also recognise that the inhibitions to cultivating interfaith understanding can come from within our own quarters, where some see such desire to cultivate such understanding as watering down our faith or "pandering to the demands of the other side". But if we, as Christians, desire to love our neighbour as Christ demands, we must press on. For surely, loving our neighbour must necessarily entail first understanding them and seeing life through their lens.
